



As we were...

This picture of the White Hart was taken in 1946, when the pub was leased to Simonds Brewery, whose hop leaf symbol adorns the east facing wall of the dining room (where now is a window).

Note the elm trees, after which Elm Farm was named. They fell victim to Dutch elm disease and, it is said, to the requirement of Inkpen sawmills for coffin wood.

The telephone box marks the entrance to the Old Post Office, when it functioned as such. In the far background (probably not visible in this print) is a roofline which probably belonged to one of the cottages which preceded Elm View.





Hamstead's helping hands at the Olympics

Two local residents enjoyed a stimulating and hard-working fortnight as volunteers at the Olympics

Jamie Gladstone of Marsh Benham House rose at 4.30am each morning to be at Windsor Great Park in time to catch the shuttle bus to Eton Dorney, where he helped visitors to the rowing events. His duties varied from scanning tickets and advising on the availability of baguettes, to redirecting ladies away from blocked toilets (although he was not issued with a pink foam glove).

Jamie rowed in his youth, which made his assignment appropriate, but what prompted him to volunteer was having been in Mexico during the 1968 Olympics, an experience which imbued him with a lifelong enthusiasm for the Olympic ethos.



Avril Chaffey in uniform – and Olympic mood

As an ardent Olympic fan **Avril Chaffey of Ash Tree Corner** volunteered because “there comes a point when you realise it's the only chance you'll ever get to take part”. She stayed with a friend in High Wycombe and commuted into the badminton events at Wembley, where her PR expertise was put to work for the Olympic News Service. She interviewed players for bulletins that were posted online for the benefit of smaller countries which lacked the resources to cover every event. She also did one shift at the Olympic Park, covering rhythmic gymnastics.

Both Jamie and Avril had to make several trips to London for interviews, training and uniform issue. The volunteers' deal did not include any expenses: only the uniform (which they could keep), food and an Oyster card in Avril's case. However they were both lucky in the ballot for tickets to the technical rehearsal of the opening ceremony the Monday before. They saw most of the performance, although one or two of the higher profile turns were kept secret.

Both also commented strongly on the powerfully positive and cheerful atmosphere amongst all who were connected with the Olympics. Even the G4 employees soon caught the mood, according to Jamie, and joined in the general cheer.

Craven Country is coming back into print

A second edition of *Craven Country: the story of Hamstead Marshall*, updated and enlarged, be out in print in time for Christmas.

The first edition went out of print several years ago, but demand for copies has endured. The availability of more local information and photographs has prompted the publication of this second edition which, unlike the first, will be digitally printed in full colour.

The book measures eight by ten inches, and has 120 pages and more than 50 pictures. Price is not yet confirmed, but likely to be between £10 and £15.

Celebrations at Plumb's Farm

Maureen Iggleden is this month celebrating 30 years' as manager of the Dogs Trust kennels at Plumb's Farm.



The kennels at Plumb's Farm already had 20 boarders when they were officially opened in 1975 by Lady Craven, as pictured above. The National Canine Defence League, as the Dogs Trust was then called, spent £20,000 adapting and equipping the premises, and the League's chairman, General Sir Reginald Hewetson also officiated at the opening.

In a recent interview with the *Newbury Weekly News*, Maureen Iggleden described her arrival to take charge of Plumb's Farm in 1982. She identified the peak time for abandoned dogs as being between summer and Christmas, rather than after Christmas as is popularly believed.

The Dogs Trust's promise is that no healthy dog will ever be destroyed, and Plumb's Farm currently has 43 awaiting new homes.
